The outcome of the Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission's 3 yearly accreditation visit to Boneham in March has now been provided to us. We are very pleased to advise that they have reaccredited Boneham Aged Care for a full three years through until May 2026.

The assessors found that we met all but one of the 42 standards during their visit. The standard not met relates to annual staff appraisals however, the Quality Commission has accepted our plan to bring this standard back into compliance by June 30th this

Infection control

Welcome to the Winter edition of the 'Banter'. It is very nice that we are living with Covid-19 more comfortably than we were last year.

We have been reminded of the importance of maintaining good hygiene and infection control practices to minimise the impact of not only Covid-19 but also influenza, respiratory viruses, and infectious conditions such as gastroenteritis.

Thank you to residents, families, staff, volunteers, and other visitors for maintaining ongoing vigilance. We will continue to keep you informed and appreciate your support of our infection control measures.

Students, trainees, and new staff: Traffic light badges

We frequently support students doing placements in fields such as nursing. We also employee our own trainees and often induct new staff into the workplace.

The students, trainees and new staff are not able to perform all the tasks that our general staff group do and it can be confusing when someone who looks like a staff member is unable to do a job or respond directly to a request without getting help.

To avoid confusion and to clearly identify them, students, trainees, and new staff wear 'Traffic Light' badges to identify that they are not general staff. **RED** BADGES are worn by trainees. They are <u>observers</u>, are getting to know residents and staff and can perform mainly 'non-caring' duties such as bed-making and some meal service. **YELLOW** BADGES are worn by students who can practice most skills under the <u>direct supervision</u> of our qualified staff. **GREEN** BADGES are worn by new staff who are in their orientation period. They are skilled and are familiarising to the workplace under the <u>indirect supervision</u> of staff mentors.

Another advantage of the traffic light badges is that it gives everyone the opportunity to identify the newcomers and make them very welcome as they become part of our great staff team

<u>Kitchen Capers</u>

Crown Mint Slice

1 tin condensed milk
200g sweet crushed biscuits (Chocolate Ripple)
1½ tblspn cocoa
1 cup coconut
200g Crown Mints, 1 cup finely chopped

Combine sweet crushed biscuits, cocoa, coconut, icing sugar and crown mints in a bowl and mix together. Add condensed milk and mix.

Roll the crown mint mixture into long thin logs. Sprinkle the logs with icing sugar.

Place the logs onto a tray and refrigerate until firm or overnight.

Cut log into 2cm pieces and serve.
